The following are just a few one-liners from our fellowship to help us stay close to our program in addition to some commentary about the quote.

1. The difference between God and me is God doesn't think he's me.

I heard a soft but collective chuckle when the lead shared this with us at last week's meeting. Immediately after, however, my mind was searching for a translation which came soon after in the form of: Stay in your lane. The Big Book mentions something about placing dependence on God above dependence on others. This concept is still something I am reluctant to fully commit to because it goes against my history. It's much easier to practice pausing and saying to myself, "thy will (not mine) be done." My Sponsor has taken me through an effective but humbling exercise to help keep my feet firmly planted on the ground. He has me write down all my resentments and next to each one write either "C" or "CC". C stands for can control and "CC" stands for cannot control. Before I am even close to halfway through, not only do I come to realize that I have little control over people, places, and things, but I start to feel relief. Seeing for myself that I can only control so much frees me from the absurdity that I am driving the bus. I highly encourage you to try this out with your Sponsor.

2. Freedom comes at a price, so don't run up a tab

This stark reminder hit me hard as I am guilty of this action especially when my life is good. The card I get to play is that I am busy. The truth is that I am busy, but life is too good to access the drive I had in my early days of 90 in 90. The other day, I got a call from a sponsee that turned into a little step work for one hour. This work completely invigorated me and was a great benefit to the alcoholic on the other end of the call. I am grateful that I can be of service to others and work my cell phone recovery program for now, but I won't be able to get away with this long term. Meetings are where the real juice is for me. Sometimes I walk in reluctantly, but the message always feels eerily directed at me in that moment. After several years sober and in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, I have NEVER walked out of a meeting feeling worse off than I was upon entering it. May the same be true for you. Life has given me a second chance and this program has showed me a new vision of looking at this life. It's not a debt to be paid, but a gift to be given back as it was given to me.

3. A.A. is like a Country/Western song played backwards

Whenever I make it over to Eastern Washington, I have a Spiritual Experience. The scenery changes, the gray clouds are gone, and I feel like I'm in the old west. Usually, that's when I find a Radio Station that plays country music. For whatever reason, that sound just fits with where I am and what I'm looking at. Just don't tell anyone I listen to Country Music please. If you haven't had the pleasure, the stereotypical theme of a Country Song is loss. The singer has lost their partner, their dog, job, and pickup truck. In other words, it sounds like a share from one of our members who is new, lost, desperate, and most importantly, READY. While I did regain my place in society, it was not quite a Country/Western song played backwards. My life got better and far exceeded my expectations. Life can still be a grind, but how I respond to people, places, and things has changed. I no longer react the same way when I was in my cups. A buffer zone has cultivated in me that will watch the same event occur, but my reaction is delayed. As my Grand-Sponsor says, I get to be an observer. Please keep in mind this season that you do not need to attend every argument you're invited to, and that invitation is not the same thing as obligation.

I hope this helps, and I'll see you at a meeting.

Point of Sale and Quickbooks Migration – The majority of the hard work is now done. Our new bookkeeper has brought in the expertise needed to finish this job. We've spent the last two weeks in November rebuilding the inventory data so that Clover (Point of Sale system matched Quickbooks online (Financial accounting). We will soon begin to explore whether to use the native data sync (which is finally enabled) or to continue manual entries.

As has been apparent, our website went down on November 21 and was down until December 5. Our apologies for any inconvenience this situation has caused. The ESIG Board will determine a path forward to ensure this doesn't occur again.

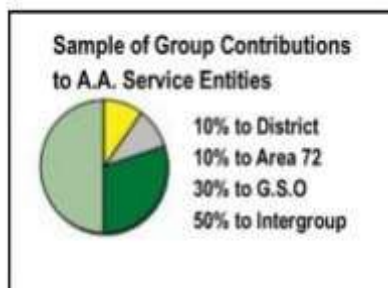
