The following are just a few one-liners from our fellowship to help us stay close to our program in addition to some commentary about the quote.

1. I need to attend meetings because only there does the whole thing get explained to me and I mellow out

There is no other experience like sitting in a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. When I was a kid, my parents had a heat pump installed in our house that was nearly as big as our car. The Heat Pump kept the house warm in the winter and cool in the summer. I vividly remember it being so overwhelmingly hot outside on a July day that I thought I would die from exposure, but the second I set foot in the house, I instantaneously felt relief. Despite what I see on social media, or how confusing life on life's terms gets, I am safe and feel at home in a meeting. Even when I attended my first meeting, I felt an odd comfort and familiarity. People at the meetings share incredible nuggets of wisdom that make both them and the steps approachable. One example was at a recent Speaker Meeting when I heard that the best way to do Step One is to also do Steps Two and Three. That idea would have gone right over my head on day one, but right now, I can use that in my work with others who hesitate working certain steps because they find the concept too cumbersome. The more I go, the more serenity I get.

2. Fear runs the show if I'm not careful

There are so many words and symptoms that dance around what takes over my life and hijacks my serenity, but the only real culprit is called fear. As I have mentioned before, fear is a subtle foe that usually has me before I'm even aware of it. The best test of what is running my show lies in how I treat others. Am I keeping them close or pushing them away? Do they approach me with sensitive, important concerns, or do they hesitate out of their own fear of not knowing how I will react? Step Ten reminds us that it is easy to let up on this program, or to let fear take over, but for me, it is a challenge to recalibrate my settings to love, faith, and service to gratitude. For so many years, fear drove and protected me. Without the constant contact, my old ways will return.

3. I keep coming back because I don't ever want to forget

The better my life gets, the more A.A. begins to shift to my rearview mirror, which is not an option if I am to stay alive and keep what this program has given to me. When A.A. is first in my life, everything else that comes second is first class. Listening to our members share their story reminds me that I have a story. For me, it is easy to forget. Life gets busy usually because I tend to take on way more than I can handle. What I take on becomes the focus, and the correct focus gets lost. First things first is all about priorities. Even now, I hesitate to fully lean into this simple program because the story my brain is telling me is that I will lose everything I value. Coming back reminds me to question what is real in my head and to communicate to the members of the program, especially my Sponsor, so I can do the opposite of my thoughts.

We've made good progress and on February 19 we're going to take the opportunity since we're closed for President's Day to do our wall-to-wall inventory. Beyond that, It looks like by the end of March we should have all of the data cleaned up and synchronized between the Point of Sale and Financial Systems.

I attended the Area 72 Quarterly last month in Bellevue. District 34 did a great job hosting the event!

Group Contributions for January were \$9,576.66. This compares to \$9825.81 last year and an average of \$7,341.42 in the month of January 2017 - 2022.

I've sent out requests to all the districts we support on cleaning up the meeting schedule. I'm asking to validate meetings that are still running, new meetings to add, and old meetings to delete. I've had a pretty good response so far.


